

12 REASONS WHY HIGH-RISES ARE <u>BAD</u> FOR STAINES

There are at least a dozen good reasons why building high-rise residential blocks in town centres is a bad idea. In the centre of a small market town like Staines-upon-Thames, with restricted road access on three sides and a river boundary on the fourth, such a massing of residential building makes even less sense.

Such developments create social, environmental and sustainability problems for the communities in which they are built, and these problems have for long been documented in professional and academic publications and the mainstream press.
